

Trinity's Property



Situated in the historic district of Nichols, Connecticut, which is a part of the Town of Trumbull, the property consisted of nine acres. In 2007, the Town purchased approximately seven acres to be maintained as open space with the proceeds received deposited in a fund for the benefit of the Parish.



The church, built after the original was destroyed by fire in 1969, is in the traditional white New England style. The sanctuary can comfortably seat 210 with room for an additional 30 in the choir loft. In addition to the Sanctuary and the choir loft, the upper level which is handicap accessible, accommodates a small chapel, the sacristy, and the church



offices. On the lower level, there is a lounge, a conference room, six classrooms and two restrooms.

The adjoining Peet Memorial Parish Hall was built in 1921 and contains a large meeting hall, kitchen, and handicap accessible restroom.



Next to the church and parish hall is the Rectory and a barn, both of which are recognized as significant contributors to the Nichols Farms Historical District. The first floor of the Rectory consists of a living room, study, lavatory, eat-in kitchen, dining area with fireplace, and a screened porch.

Upstairs are four bedrooms and a full bath and the home has a full basement. The barn is used for storage and has space to store two cars.



Located between the church and the Rectory is a Memorial Garden. Consecrated in 1996, the garden provides a peaceful spot for meditation and the interment of the ashes of parishioners and their families.

The church has extensive parking which is shared with and jointly maintained by the local branch library. Trinity

has parking for over 60 cars and there are separate spaces designated for handicap accessibility.
